Recruitment

ELIGIBILITY

Before being considered for membership in any Sorority & Fraternity Life organization, every student must complete at least 12 credit hours. These credit hours must be earned through course enrollment at Ohio State or another institution that is fully matriculated. Credit hours earned through examination or Advanced Placement (AP) do not count towards the requirement.

For transfer students who participate in recruitment during their first semester at Ohio State, Sorority & Fraternity Life uses their grades and credit hours from their previous institution to determine eligibility. For transfer students who have grades and credit hours from Ohio State, Sorority & Fraternity Life uses those figures to determine eligibility. Cumulative grade-point average (GPA) will be based on the information that is available in the Student Information System (SIS) through the Ohio State Registrar.

Sorority & Fraternity Life requires all potential new members to be in good academic standing. Students must have a minimum 2.5 cumulative GPA in order to participate in recruitment. Individual chapters may have higher minimum requirements and you can ask about specifics during your conversations. The following chart shows how your options may be limited due to GPA. Each chapter has different academic opportunities for support. GPA is just one factor of a very large picture that makes up best mutual fit, so do not feel fully restricted or discouraged when entering the process. The table to the right is a general overview.

Benefits of Membership



FIND YOUR HOME | GIVE BACK | BE PREPARED

The Ohio State University has the fifth-largest student population of all U.S. colleges. With nearly 60,000 peers, Ohio State students often feel lost in a sea of people. Panhellenic membership will help you to find your home in the Ohio State community.

The strong emphasis upon philanthropy and service within Sorority & Fraternity Life is special. Your membership will require engagement with philanthropy and service, which are often members' favorite aspects of their organizations.



Academics



The sorority experience allows you to meet and network with so many people in your chapter, the Greek community, and our entire campus.

You will begin to develop strong interview skills as a potential new member, which will continue to grow throughout your membership experience.



The average cumulative GPA for Panhellenic members is 3.58. In addition to surpassing the average for all undergraduate women (3.56), we also achieved a higher average than all other Greek councils.



Philanthropy versus Service

“Service” is about sharing your time and talents with an important cause. “Philanthropy” involves providing funds or other gifts to organizations. A key difference is that service is usually hands-on, whereas philanthropy provides the tools to support that hands-on work.

Community Service: "voluntary work intended to help people in a particular area."

Examples: Street cleaning, painting a school, serving food at a food shelter

Philanthropy: "the desire to promote the welfare of others, expressed especially by the generous donation of money to good causes."

Examples: Hosting a fundraiser, a competitive volleyball game that raises money, a food drive where purchases go towards a cause.

Example: Zeta Tau Alpha and Breast Cancer Awareness, Tri Delta and St. Jude's Hospital

Important Terms

PRIMARY RECRUITMENT

OHIO STATE PHA

- **ACTIVE** – A college undergraduate who has been initiated into fraternity or sorority membership.
- **BID** – An invitation to join a sorority or fraternity. During Primary (spring) Recruitment, no bid (verbal or written) will be extended except through the Panhellenic Association. A bid issued in any other manner is not binding and is in violation of Panhellenic rules. However, bids may be extended verbally or in writing by the chapter(s) during Continuous Open Bidding (COB).
- **CHAPTER** – A chartered undergraduate or alumnae group recognized by a fraternity or sorority.
- **CONTINUOUS OPEN BIDDING (COB)** – An informal process that Panhellenic chapters use to recruit new members outside the designated formal recruitment period to reach quota and/or Panhellenic total. This is less formal and not all chapters are eligible to participate.
- **FRATERNITY** – Originating from the Greek word “phratar,” meaning member of a group, this is the term most commonly used to refer to Greek-letter organizations for men. Some sororities are actual women’s fraternities.
- **INITIATION** – The ceremony in which a new member becomes an active member.
- **LEGACY** – A woman whose mother, sister, or in some cases grandmother, is an alumna or an active member of a sorority. Because each woman is considered on an individual basis, the sorority is not obligated to extend a bid to a legacy. By the same token, a potential new member should choose the group with which she feels most comfortable.
- **NATIONAL PANHELLENIC CONFERENCE** – The coordination body of all college Panhellenic Association members in the United States and Canada.
- **NEW MEMBER** – A woman who has accepted a bid to join a sorority but has not been initiated.
- **PANHELLENIC ASSOCIATION (PHA)** – The governing and programming board for sororities at Ohio State that are associated with the National Panhellenic Conference (NPC).
- **PHILANTHROPY** – A charitable fundraiser or service project sponsored by a fraternity or sorority.
- **PLEDGING** - The process of accepting a bid and becoming a new member in a sorority but before initiation.
- **POTENTIAL NEW MEMBER (PNM)** - Used to describe the women participating in the recruitment process that have not yet joined a sorority (This is you!).
- **PREFERENCING (PREFFING)** – At the end of the Primary Recruitment preference round, a potential new member indicates which sorority she would like to join by listing a maximum of two sororities in order of preference (first and second choice).
- **PRIORITY RANKING** – A process similar to preferencing, potential new members will rank which chapters they would like to return to the next day of primary recruitment. Priority ranking is used following all rounds of recruitment except for the preference round.
- **RECRUITMENT** – The process organizations use to bring in new members.
- **ROUNDS** – Primary Recruitment consists of a number of structured, timed and themed events. A series of events with the same theme is referred to as a “round.” Rounds include: open house, philanthropy, sisterhood and preference rounds. At the end of each round, you priority rank the chapters visited during the round.
- **SISTER** – A term used within a women’s fraternity or sorority when referring to other members.
- **SORORITY** – A Greek-lettered organization designated for women; some chapters are sororities and some are women’s fraternities even though we often call all NPC chapters “sororities.”

ANTI-HAZING

STATEMENT AND RESOURCES

The Ohio State University Panhellenic Association condemns hazing within our chapters, council, community, and country at large. As leaders in our individual organizations and our wider Sorority & Fraternity Life community, we are responsible for speaking out against hazing. We must come together to end hazing so that Sorority & Fraternity Life can be safe for everyone. In addition to Sorority & Fraternity Life, hazing also occurs in student organizations such as athletic teams and other groups with significant social impact. Hazing touches not only the school, but also the friends, family, and community of those involved. It is imperative that we all begin to speak up about this issue if we have not done so already.

Hazing is defined in the code of student conduct as doing, requiring or encouraging any act, whether or not the act is voluntarily agreed upon, in conjunction with initiation, continued membership, or participation in any group, that causes or creates a substantial risk of causing mental or physical harm or humiliation. Such acts may include, but are not limited to, use of alcohol, creation of excessive fatigue and paddling, punching or kicking in any form. Failure to intervene, prevent or report acts of hazing may constitute a violation of this section.

In addition to the Ohio State Code of Student Conduct, the State of Ohio enacted Senate Bill 126—more commonly known as Collin’s Law. The bill increased penalties related to hazing a felony/misdemeanor and holds staff, advisors and volunteers accountable if they failure to report Collins Law is named after Collin Wiant, an Ohio University student who tragically lost his life in a hazing incident in 2018. It shows that hazing is not tolerated statewide.

If you or someone you know has experienced hazing, in a SFL group our other student organization, please do not hesitate to reach out to any of the resources listed below. You can also use these resources to report anyone who you know participates in hazing.

Conversation

- Your two main goals are to get to know active members and to help them get to know you!
- Maximize the time that you have with each chapter on your schedule.
- You should be having deeper conversations each consecutive round.
- Ask active members about things such as:
 - financial responsibility
 - managing time between their chapter
 - other extracurriculars
 - leadership opportunities
- It's okay to have conversations about topics that aren't related to Sorority & Fraternity Life.
- If you are having a great conversation during a party, please do not feel the need to stop the good vibes!
- However, we do recommend that you keep your reason for going through this process in the back of your mind. Reasons could be:
 - philanthropy
 - sisterhood
 - the benefits that come from Sorority & Fraternity Life
- Listen to the active members' responses to your questions.
- When you're nervous, it can be easy to become preoccupied with what you want to say next. Avoid this because it weakens conversations when you don't actively listen to the person that you're talking to.

Self-Care

- Write a to-do list for the week.
- Bring water and snacks to eat and drink between rounds.
- Talk to a loved one for mental support.
- Prioritize yourself: treat yourself with a face mask or a coffee before rounds.
- We are all students first, stay focused on your assignments.
- Bring walking shoes.
- Order food well before you want to eat, lines get long during Primary Recruitment.
- Let your Rho Gamma know if you need a break, or have any questions or concerns, they are there to help you.

HOW DOES RECRUITMENT WORK?

There are four different rounds. Each round will allow you to meet women from each chapter and find the chapter where you could best see yourself. As the process progresses, you will attend fewer events for a more extended period at each, allowing you to narrow down your choices and devote more time to the chapters with which you feel the strongest connection. The chapters, in turn, will participate in this mutual selection process and determine the women who best embody their chapter ideals. This process is to help YOU find your best fit, not anyone else.

WHAT HAPPENS AT A RECRUITMENT EVENT?

A recruitment event is a time for you to learn more about individual chapters and for chapter members to learn more about you. You will meet with and talk to various chapter members and learn about the chapter's values, academics, and philanthropies. Most women are meeting you for the first time and will need to ask the same "get to know you" questions. REMINDER: Always be Yourself! You want to end up where you truly feel at home.

AM I GUARANTEED A BID IF I AM A LEGACY?

Not necessarily. Each sorority has its policies regarding legacies, and you're encouraged to look for that information on each chapter's website. While it can be exciting to connect or tie to a chapter, the most important part is to keep an open mind through the recruitment process and find the best fit for YOU. Being a legacy to a chapter can be helpful but will not guarantee you a place in that chapter.

I HAVE A SCHEDULING CONFLICT DURING RECRUITMENT. CAN I STILL PARTICIPATE? WHAT IF I GET SICK?

We will work with any woman with a campus-related conflict, such as academic classes or sports. If you have any questions regarding this policy, please contact our VP of Recruitment at vprec.osupha@gmail.com NO LATER than the Monday prior to the beginning of recruitment. If you are to become ill during recruitment, immediately contact your Rho Gamma, and they can help you.

WHAT IF I NEED ACCOMMODATIONS?

Reasons for accommodations can include but are not limited to needing wheelchair accessibility for chapter houses, language interpreters, or closed-captioning. If you need accommodations, please contact the PHA advisor at Nunez.163@osu.edu.

SOMEONE TOLD ME I'M GUARANTEED A BID; SHOULD I BELIEVE HER?

No. One individual member cannot guarantee they will be joining that organization. Otherwise known as "bid-promising," Sorority members cannot promise membership to any potential new member. If a member tells you that you are "guaranteed" to be in her organization, let the PHA advisor know as soon as possible, in private, and they will handle it accordingly. WHAT IF I FIND PRIMARY RECRUITMENT ISN'T FOR ME?

Going through primary recruitment is a great way to immerse yourself in sorority life and decide whether or not you're interested in being a part of the Panhellenic community. That said, primary recruitment is not the only way to join a sorority. Some chapters also gain new members after primary recruitment in a process called continuous open bidding, or COB. This informal process looks much different than primary recruitment and is another great way to get involved in an organization.

Membership Selection

Is it bad if you don't have a full schedule?

It is VERY uncommon to be invited back to every chapter that you selected or have a full schedule. It can feel a little shocking to go from 18 chapters to a smaller number but know that the end goal is to help PNMs and Chapters focus on the best mutual fit. Please do not be discouraged if your schedule is not full. Enjoy any breaks that you may have!

What is a MRABA?

*A MRABA is a **binding agreement** that each potential new member signs after they attend their final party of Preference Round during Primary Recruitment. If a potential new member signs a MRABA and receives a bid, **then they are bound to that chapter.** No exceptions can be made due to the binding agreement of a MRABA.*

If a PNM declines their bid, then they cannot participate in recruitment until the following Primary Recruitment cycle in 2025. This is also the case if they accept their bid and de-pledge before Initiation.

Why am I going back to chapters I didn't list?

It is common to be invited back to a chapter that you did not list if you have the space in your schedule. The chapter has invited you back because they think that you would be a strong addition to their organization, so please return with an open mind. Many Panhellenic members have found their homes in chapters that they did not select to list after Meet the Chapters and couldn't be happier. Sometimes, all you need is another impression!



How does membership selection work?

You will make selections at the end of each round by listing your chapters in order from most preferred to least preferred. These lists are not binding until Preference Round. Through a mutual selection process, you will receive your schedule at the beginning of the next round.

*We recommend that you maximize your options each round and list every chapter that you have during your selections. If you choose to single-intentional preference, then you will not be maximizing your options and have a higher chance of being released from the process. **If you intentionally skip parties or listings, you will be removed from the process.***

There is no suggested attire for this round because you will not be face-to-face with anyone.

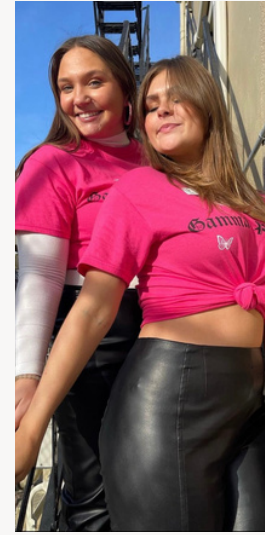

Sorority and Fraternity Life Councils

The Ohio State University has maintained a solid Greek community for over 140 years. There are currently over 3,700 students who are active members of Sorority & Fraternity Life organizations on campus. All organizations are governed by one of four councils: the Interfraternity Council, the Multicultural Greek Council, the National Pan-Hellenic Council, and the Panhellenic Association.

The councils cultivate chapters dedicated to academics, philanthropy, service, and siblinghood. The chapters then promote individual growth and development, preparing members to be responsible citizens.



Multicultural Greek Council (MGC)

The Multicultural Greek Council (MGC) governs cultural and service-oriented sororities and fraternities at Ohio State. The council serves to inspire culture, trust, support, understanding, and friendship between its members and all members of the Columbus community.

National Pan-Hellenic Council (NPHC)

The National Pan-Hellenic Council (NPHC) governs historically Black sororities and fraternities at Ohio State. The council has been designed to assure that its chapters work together while maintaining their own identities. Its chapters provide community service and promote the welfare of the Columbus community and beyond.

Interfraternity Council

The Interfraternity Council (IFC) governs general and social fraternities at Ohio State. The council coordinates recruitment activities, motivates academic achievement, and promotes community service.

The Panhellenic Association may not be the best fit for you and that is okay! We want you to make the best decision for yourself and encourage you to research all councils and pursue membership in MCGC or NPHC if desired. MCGC and NPHC chapters are interest and affinity based, but not exclusive. Therefore if you do not share a cultural aspect around an organization's founding, you are still likely eligible for potential membership.
